CLASSROOM HELPERS: 1

CLASS DESCRIPTION

This theme-based writing curriculum will expose students to the ancient world through cultural literature and the study of famous places and events, while they learn to write using the IEW Structure and Style® writing method. This method is designed to develop the student's organization skills (structure) and artistic flair (style), equipping students at any writing level to experience growth.

Throughout the year, students will progress from writing Key Word Outlines (KWO) and simple paragraphs to short essays and creative writing assignments. We will also touch on the process of illustrating what we write.

Students will need to take notes during class, either copying the KWO we create together or working to create their own KWO in small groups. They will be expected to participate in discussions and classroom games as well.

HOMEWORK REQUIREMENTS

Students can expect to dedicate an average of 2 hours a week on writing, revising, or illustrating their work. Parental involvement is key at this grade-level. Students will have weekly assignments that build on previous writing skills and efforts. They will write, revise, and/or illustrate assignments weekly.

All students will need to submit final versions of their writing assignments in typed (computer printed) format for their individual presentation binders.

CLASSROOM HELPERS: 1

CLASS DESCRIPTION

This course will teach basic writing and editing skills, as well as unlock each writer's voice through weekly writing prompts. Topics covered will include persuasive, expository, informational, compare/contrast, personal narrative, and humorous essays. The class will include foundational instruction on brainstorming, proper construction of sentences and paragraphs, editing, compiling a works cited page, and MLA formatting. We will also read 3-4 books which will serve as a springboard to good writing and the basis of several writing assignments. This is a graded course. Books being considered are *Number the Stars*, *Life of Frederick Douglass*, *Hatchet* and *The Magician's Nephew*.

HOMEWORK REQUIREMENTS

- The course requires intensive time each week dedicated to writing and editing. Students will be
 expected to submit weekly written assignments and to complete all homework projects by the due
 date
- Attendance will be a significant part of the student's grade. It is crucial that the student come to class having completed the homework assignments thoroughly and thoughtfully.
- Parents must commit to being heavily involved in helping their student complete and edit each assignment and to help their child meet the class deadlines.

CLASS DESCRIPTION

The students will read (and hopefully come to enjoy) works of literature from a variety of countries and time periods. We will study how to read a work of literature, what makes a work worth reading, how various authors have influenced the world. I will give a variety of quizzes, tests, and writing assignments designed to help the students understand and dig deeper into the readings.

- Approximately 1-1.25 hours of homework a day
- Journaling sufficient to promote active class participation
- I will email occasional links to supplemental student helps that the student will need to watch or read
- Active participation in class discussions is expected

Other: This course contains a composition component. A portion of each class will be dedicated to teaching writing skills. Students will be expected to submit a written assignment every 2-3 weeks as well as to complete all homework projects.

Grading: This course is based heavily on class discussion. Consequently, attendance will be a significant part of the student's grade. It is crucial that the student come to class having read the assignment thoroughly and thoughtfully, prepared to add to our class discussion

Reading: A syllabus with weekly reading assignments will be provided. Texts being considered for the class include: *One Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich* (Russia), *Cyrano de Bergerac* (France), *The Picture of Dorian Gray* (Ireland), *The Prince* (Italy), *Shakespeare* (Britain), *The Odyssey* (Greece)

Required Text & Supplies: I would like to purchase the same edition of the books we are reading for each student so the class will be, literally, on the same page. In addition to the texts, the student will need a notebook for class notes and for journaling about their reading

Class Fee: I will work diligently to find the best price for the books we are reading while still purchasing editions that include quality notes and student helps. If I am able to purchase the books for less than the class fee listed, I will refund the difference to the families.

MATHEMATICS – PRE-ALGEBRA – GRADES 6-9

CLASSROOM HELPERS: 1

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course gives the foundation for success in Algebra 1. All topics are introductory and are intended to be used in Algebra 1. Topics will include operations with integers, understanding variables and solving equations, rational numbers, ratio & proportion, percent, measurement & the metric system, graphs and exponents, and polynomials. Class time will entail reviewing homework, taking quizzes, discussing them, and introducing the next topic. Emphasis will be placed on learning through practicing problems in class with the instructor and other students, and independently at home.

REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENTS:

The student is expected to complete all assigned work (homework, tests, quizzes, and videos) BEFORE the next class and with all work shown and completed neatly. Although some problems may be difficult, the student is expected to attempt all problems to the best of their ability. Math is best learned by doing, making mistakes, and then correcting those mistakes.

REQUIREMENTS FOR PARENTS:

Parents are to come alongside students and help them complete assignments to the best of their ability and on time for the subsequent class period. Parents are expected to proctor tests and quizzes and ensure they are returned before the next class.

GRADING:

The student will receive credit for homework completed, tests, quizzes, and the end-of-year project.

MATHEMATICS – ALGEBRA 1 – GRADES 8-12

HOMEWORK HOURS: 5-7 hours per week

CLASSROOM HELPERS: 1

CLASS DESCRIPTION

This high school level math course covers a complete year of Algebra. Topics will include order of operations, functions, polynomials, factoring, radicals, and the quadratic formula. Class time will be spent going over weekly homework, introducing the next week's concepts, and answering questions from the students.

REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENTS

Students must have passed (or have the equivalency of) a pre-algebra class with a grade of B or higher.

Students, you will be expected to spend four to six hours a week, outside of class, reading and working problems in the text. You will be expected to complete either four or five lessons or a test each week for a total of 4 or 5 days of work outside of class (depending on the week). You will need to stay on the schedule of the class, take tests at home, and turn in your tests as scheduled. No separate midterm or final is planned.

REQUIREMENTS FOR PARENTS

Parents, you will be expected to ensure that your students are staying on schedule and their work is corrected. The students MUST show their work as they complete their homework assignments. In addition, parents must be willing to administer, proctor, and check the chapter quizzes then have their student correct all wrong answers on each quiz. Parents will be expected to administer and proctor the chapter tests at home, but the teacher will grade the tests. This class moves at a somewhat rapid pace, and it is imperative that all students keep up with the schedule.

GRADING AND TESTS

The students will get credit for completing their homework on-time, correcting it, writing out definitions and/or formulas as assigned, and for their quizzes and test grades.

CLASSROOM HELPERS: 1

CLASS DESCRIPTION

This high school level math course covers a complete year of Algebra 2. A thorough treatment of advanced algebraic concepts will be provided through the study and graphing of functions, equations, inequalities, systems of equations, polynomials, rational and radical equations, complex numbers, and sequences and series. Students will build a strong connection between algebraic and graphic representations of functions.

Class time will be spent introducing math concepts, note-taking, homework review, potentially homework time, and preparation for tests and end of the semester finals.

STUDENT REQUIREMENTS

Pre-requisite: Successful completion of Algebra 1. It is recommended that Geometry is taken before Algebra 2, but not required.

Students, you will be expected to spend three to five hours a week, outside of class, reading and working problems in the text. You will be expected to complete four lessons and/or a test each week, for a total of four (recommended) days of work outside of class. You will need to stay on schedule with the class, and turn in homework and tests as scheduled. A midterm and final exam will be given.

PARENT REQUIREMENTS

Parents, you will be expected to ensure that your students are staying on schedule, and their work is corrected, and turned in on time. The students must show their work as they complete their assignments and take the tests. Parents will be expected to administer and proctor the chapter tests at home, but the teacher will grade the tests.

CLASSROOM HELPERS: 1

CLASS DESCRIPTION

This high school level math course covers a complete year of Geometry. The course emphasizes reasoning skills through the exploration of geometric relationships, including properties of geometric figures, trigonometric relationships, and mathematical proofs. Students will also focus on two- and three-dimensional reasoning skills, coordinate and transformational geometry, and the use of geometric models to solve problems. Graphing technologies will help visualize, analyze and understand algebraic behaviors and geometric patterns, to provide a powerful tool for visualizing and verifying solutions.

STUDENT REQUIREMENTS

Pre-requisite: Successful completion of Algebra 1. It is recommended that Geometry is taken before Algebra 2, but not required. Students, you will be expected to spend three to five hours a week, outside of class, reading and working problems in the text. You will be expected to complete four lessons and/or a review and test each week, for a total of four (recommended) days of work outside of class. You will need to stay on schedule with the class, and turn in homework and tests as scheduled.

CLASS DESCRIPTION

This year we will use the newly updated 3rd edition of the Apologia Physical Science textbook. This is a new textbook edition, and the content has been updated and expanded to include more physical science topics. This year we will cover atomic structure, the periodic table, chemical bonds, reactions and energy, motion, forces, energy, waves and sound, light, electricity and magnetism, and Earth's structure, weathering, and atmosphere. Class time will include lectures, practice problems, and lab activities.

PRE-REQUISITES

Pre-algebra or confidence in arithmetic, an ability to work independently, write reasonably confidently, and a willingness to learn.

HOMEWORK REQUIREMENTS

Weekly homework assignments include reading the text, solving problems, writing lab reports, and taking tests. I will record grades and provide semester grade reports to parents based on homework, lab reports, and tests.

NATURAL SCIENCE – BIOLOGY – GRADES 9-12

CLASSROOM HELPERS: 1

CLASS DESCRIPTION

This course will consist of both lab instruction (most Tuesdays) and a review of the chapter being covered (Thursdays). Using the text Science Shepherd Biology, we will approach biology with a micro to macro approach beginning with basic biochemistry, cellular biology and genetics. Afterwards we will learn about organisms from the 5 kingdoms and end with human anatomy and physiology.

HOMEWORK REQUIREMENTS

Plan on 4-6 hours each week. There may be some supplemental reading to cover certain topics in more detail. Each student will participate in the Year End Event by creating a display board related to a topic of specific interest to the student related to our study of Biology. CLASSROOM HELPERS: 1

CLASS DESCRIPTION

This college-preparatory laboratory-based chemistry course will provide a firm foundation in the basic laws and theories of modern chemistry. Topics include measurements and units, the Periodic Table of the Elements, Dalton's atomic theory, Lewis structures, stoichiometry, acid/base reactions, thermodynamics, and kinetics. During class time, we will perform experiments, analyze results, and solve mathematical problems introduced in chemistry.

PRE-REQUISITES

To take this class, students should have completed Algebra I. Students will be expected to keep up with the volume of work; those who fall seriously behind may be asked to complete the class on their own because they will be unable to participate adequately in class activities and labs. Chemistry is a mathheavy and challenging science, and students will need help if they are struggling (tutoring). Parents and students will need email and internet access to communicate with Mrs. Schad and access assignments (Google Classroom).

HOMEWORK REQUIREMENTS

Weekly homework assignments will include reading from the text, completing calculations, and/or other activities to help students learn the material. Students will be expected to complete assigned homework, tests, and labs each week; the estimated time per week for students is 5 to 7 hours. A "Science Fair" project will be required and displayed at the Year End Event.

Tests: Tests will be taken at home. Parents are expected to proctor the tests, which Mrs. Schad will grade. The tests will be reviewed in class after they are completed.

Labs: Students will perform lab experiments in class and are expected to complete them at home. They will be turned in the week after they are assigned.

Grades: Grade reports will be based on tests, guizzes, labs, homework, and the year-end project.

CLASSROOM HELPERS: 1

CLASS DESCRIPTION

This college-preparatory, laboratory-intensive physics course provides a detailed introduction to the methods and concepts of general physics. Heavily emphasizing vector analysis, this course provides the student with a strong background in one-dimensional and two-dimensional motion, Newton's laws and their application, gravity, work and energy, momentum, periodic motion, waves, optics, electrostatics, electrodynamics, electrical circuits, and magnetism.

During class time we will perform experiments, analyze results, and solve mathematical problems involving physics. Students will be expected to maintain a laboratory notebook.

PRE-REQUISITES

Students should have completed Algebra I and have an introduction to the definitions of sine, cosine, and tangent. Parents and students will need access to email for communication with the teacher.

HOMEWORK REQUIREMENTS

There will be weekly homework assignments, which will include reading from the text, completing charts, doing calculations, and/or other activities to help students learn the material. Students will be expected to complete assigned homework, tests and/or lab write-ups each week; estimated time per week for students is 4 to 6 hours. Tests: Tests will be provided by the teacher and should be taken by the student at home. Parents will be expected to proctor tests; the teacher will grade them. Tests will be reviewed in class after they are completed. A two-hour midterm and final exam will be scheduled outside of class time in January and May. **Grades:** We will record grades and provide semester grade reports to parents based on tests, lab reports, homework, and midterm and final exam scores.

Running a household is totally manageable if you have the right skills! This course will teach your children various skills that will help prepare them for a lifetime of success, both inside and outside of the home. Units of study will include:

- **Cooking and Baking** basic kitchen skills, knife safety, safe food preparation, measuring, meal planning and making lots of yummy food!

CLASS DESCRIPTION

We're starting a Speech Club! We will be part of the Christian homeschool speech and debate league, <u>Stoa</u> (stoausa.org), and will share their mission statement: "To train homeschool students to speak boldly and change the world for Christ." Parents and students work together to prepare students for speech tournaments through the school year. They develop a host of skills, including speaking, presentation, writing, research, and professionalism. In addition, they grow in their character and faith and build friendships. This is a deep activity that can involve the whole family and grow with students, from upper elementary through high school.

STUDENT REQUIREMENTS

Minimum age: 9 years old. Maximum age: 18 years old on Oct. 1 of current school year

PARENT REQUIREMENTS

One parent per family regularly attends club meetings to critique speeches and assist as needed. Parents also serve as judges at tournaments. Parents may bring younger children (age < 9) to club meetings, as long as their behavior is not disruptive. (Many younger siblings end up learning speech skills in club through "osmosis.")

CLASS DESCRIPTION

This class is designed to include the following:

- Contemporary Band Instrumentalists (guitar, bass, uke, piano/keys, percussion/drums, etc.)

The class is designed to teach students to effectively use their instrument or voice to play or sing with others in church or in other contexts, using classical as well as more contemporary styles. CLASS DESCRIPTION

This class is designed for students who would like to pursue a college education, though all are welcome! We will learn strategies for taking the SAT exam and improving test scores over the course of the year. My goal is to make this fun! My dad always told me to treat the SAT like a game or puzzle and I believe that, when students learn to approach it that way, it removes some of the anxiety that goes along with taking a test and leads to a more enjoyable experience and improved scores. I am also a firm believer in studying incrementally over time, rather than trying to cram in the few weeks leading up to the exam. For that reason, SAT prep is valuable even for 9th graders, who don't need an SAT score yet (though you can use an SAT score for proof-of-progress for the county), but still benefit from gradual preparation. In addition to SAT prep, we will work on study skills and organization and each student will learn how to write a personal essay that will help set them apart in college applications. I plan for this to be a fun class, but students will only get out what they put in. We will do the bulk of the SAT prep during the months leading up to the March SAT date (this will likely be the last opportunity for seniors to take the exam with the intention of raising their score and perhaps placing them in a different scholarship bracket) and focus more heavily on the essay and study skills later in the year. If students commit to applying themselves to the completion of the assigned work, my hope is that they will finish the class with a much greater sense of confidence as they navigate the college application process.

HOMEWORK REQUIREMENTS

Students will be required to join our Khan Academy classroom and download the Bluebook Exam app prior to the first day of class. I will send out further instruction during the summer. There will be approximately two hours of homework assigned each week.

REQUIRED MATERIALS AND SUPPLIES

Students should have a 1.5-2 inch divider with dividers and notebook paper. Students will be asked to bring a laptop with them to class for some class periods. I will let them know when a laptop will be needed. If they have a particular calculator they are comfortable with, they should bring it to each class. Personal information: As stated in previous years, if inclement weather or some weird circumstances keep me home, I will Zoom class. **I DO NOT** like Zooming my classes so it will not be often!

Expectations: Students will come to class having completed all homework assignments and having brought all required materials. **Students will also speak only French to each other in class!**

Differences between my French 1-3 honors classes and French 4 advanced: We will speak **TOTALLY IN FRENCH.** Note that these materials /assignments are no longer required in French 4 ⊚:

- NO sign off sheets/ Quizlet
- NO daily homework tasks (<u>much less</u> hw than previous classes... about 1 hr a week except when occasional papers are due- **depends on the student and procrastination**)
- No tri-fold board project
- No textbook/ activity manual etc.
- No final exam or midterm (they will only have a final project instead)

Students WILL be learning:

- How to better communicate in French verbally and in writing
- French culture in several areas including social, technological, art, etc.,
- To improve their ability to write correctly and fluidly,
- To research topics in French and then reduce their findings to communicate concisely and fluently about their topic,
- And more!

Reading list: We will be reading a few books this year including:

- Abridged versions of Le conte de Monte Cristo and Les trois mousquetaires.
- Select stories from Contes français. (Camu, Maupassant etc.)
- Le Petit Prince

I will provide all reading books for the students. Reminder: No final grades will be released to a student who has any of my personal materials outstanding. All my materials will be collected on the last day of class.

Additional materials needed:

- Access to Internet for research.
- PRINTER with well-stocked ink for printing research and other materials.
- Ability to send occasional homework assignments to me via scanning. <u>Both parents and students</u>
 must use a free Adobe app for scanning back any kind of homework! (or have a high definition
 quality scanner)
- An unabridged French dictionary OR <u>dedication</u> to spend time at co-op with mine!
- MANY mechanical pencils and a 2"-3" loose-leaf binder w/ pockets, dividers and loose paper.

Movies: The movies we watch will be in French, but most will be with English subtitles \odot . Please keep in mind that there are no movie rating guidelines in France/ Europe and although each movie has been screened individually by me (and others throughout the years), they will not be "squeaky clean, and some will have more mature vocabulary and themes. However, I have an amazing techie son who has edited the movies for me to eliminate many questionable scenes/material. If you have any concerns, please contact me.

Special movie event in November: Every year my French 4 students come to my home for an EIGHT HOUR event to watch a French mini-series of the book *Le Conte de Monte Cristo*. We take advantage of this time together to enjoy French foods, go to a French restaurant in Winchester, play French games, if time etc. Since I now live so far away, we need to do this over a two or three-day period at my home, either **immediately after Co-op on a Thursday OR** beginning **on a Friday**. The proposed dates are:

I will need one parent/aide (or two at the most) to attend this fun weekend where we will indulge in authentic French/ Belgian foods etc. PLEASE let me know on the parent/ student agreement all of the pairs of dates that will work for your student!!

Grades / Tests or Quizzes/ Papers / Absences: Students will write short papers or will take short tests or quizzes on some of their reading materials. For those assessments sent home, parents will need to proctor and sign **across the seal of the envelope** as usual. **If your student is a senior,** indicate that clearly on the Parent/Student agreement form so that I will have 1st semester grades done in time for college consideration. My simple grading scale has not changed: 0-69F, 70-79C, 89-89B, 90-99A, and I never curve.

As always, a <u>parent</u> must notify me <u>via email</u> <u>a minimum</u> of 2 weeks before her student's planned absence so that I can have any materials s/he might need prepared early enough and so that I have enough time to record the class that day for your student.

National French Exam: Students will practice throughout the year by taking previous *Grand Concours* (National French Exam) French 4 exams and then will take the actual exam in early March as we did this past year and will need the same equipment: laptop with latest version of Chrome, earbuds, and charge cord – just in case! The cost is usually \$10. The probable NFE dates are March 11 with snow day of March 18 (The 2025 test dates aren't sent out this early but I'm fairly sure these are safe dates).

FYI for those who have attended FR 1 through my French 4 advanced class: By the end of this class, students will have covered most colleges' first and second college level French **literature/ conversation** material and strong students who **have also focused on immersion** usually score above average on AP exams, SAT 2 exams, CLEP exams, etc. In college, their accents and grammar knowledge are frequently much better than their peers' and they are regularly offered jobs as tutors for the French department (after the French professor hears and sees their abilities). Although they will often be placed in a 300-level class (this is based on feedback from former students.), I always recommend that students take the level of French that is **one level below placement** so that they can get used to college/adult vocabulary and pace.

Regardless, it is worth each student's while to at least minor in French in college if they've taken this class because not only are they WAY ahead of their classmates, but they could even choose to study abroad in Paris or Brussels. The benefits of studying abroad (even for a 1 or 3 month stay/class) would include: expanding their fluency, gaining cultural advantages, and of course increasing many other invaluable life experiences, not to mention the rich mission ministry opportunities they would have!

Please call me throughout the year if there are any issues you feel a need to bring up with me. I feel very blessed and excited to be teaching your student again!
